# 2035 General Plan Update



**What's New?**

- Consultant contract for Belmont Village Specific Plan was approved by the City Council on April 28<sup>th</sup>.
- The City's Housing Element has cleared State approvals, and is scheduled for adoption by the City Council on May 12<sup>th</sup>.

**What we're working on now:**

- Compilation Report being prepared on City-wide mail-in survey results; Week of May 11<sup>th</sup> is the target for completion.
- Currently designing Community Open House and Planning/Parks & Recreation Commission joint Study Session for draft Preferred Plan.

### **Belmont Zoning Ordinance & City Code Amendments Project**

On Tuesday, May 12<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 P.M., the Belmont City Council will hold a public hearing to consider amendments to the residential development and tree regulations in the Belmont Zoning Ordinance (BZO) and Belmont City Code, and the associated recommendations of the Planning Commission and Parks and Recreation Commission. The proposed changes to the BZO and City Code include amendments to:

- Regulations governing development in residential districts (BZO Section 4)
- Parking requirements including number of spaces and covered requirements (BZO Section 8)
- Single family design review process and standards for approval (BZO Section 13A)
- Secondary dwelling unit review process and standards (BZO Section 24)
- Add definitions (BZO Section 2), and general development regulations amendments (BZO Section 9)
- Tree regulations including permit requirements, removal criteria and conditions (BZO Section 13A and City Code Chapter 25)

The Belmont Planning Commission held public meetings to consider the proposed amendments on March 17<sup>th</sup>, and March 31<sup>st</sup>. On April 7<sup>th</sup> they concluded their review of the proposed BZO and City Code amendments, providing recommendations to the City Council on the draft recommendations. The Parks & Recreation Commission reviewed the proposed Tree Ordinance Amendments on February 4<sup>th</sup> and concluded their review on April 1<sup>st</sup>, providing recommendations on the draft amendments.

On April 28<sup>th</sup> the City Council conducted a public meeting to review the Planning and Parks & Recreation Commission recommendations, and provided policy direction on the proposed BZO and City Code Amendments project, which will be considered on May 12<sup>th</sup>.

## Alameda De Las Pulgas/San Carlos Avenue Corridor Study Community Open House



The project team welcomed over 50 members of the public to the second project outreach meeting. This Community Open House was held on April 30<sup>th</sup>. Team members answered questions and received comments from residents, local employees, school and business representatives, City and School leaders. The corridor was reviewed for improvement to the walking, bicycling and driving environment with the goal of providing continuous, comfortable and safer facilities, while addressing the unique aspect of the traffic patterns



related to the two school campuses in close proximity of each other. Potential alternatives were



presented to the community for review and selection of preference. The attendees were actively engaged by participating in discussions about the Conceptual Improvement Plan recommendations for the Corridor. The project team is compiling all the comments and input received, including feedback about existing corridor challenges, the purpose of planned improvements, and other concerns and observations.

The goals of the Corridor Study Project are two-fold:

- Determine the adequacy of the corridor for multi-modal use by evaluating the ability to accommodate pedestrians, bicyclists, transit riders and motorists under existing and projected future conditions.
- Develop context sensitive transportation alternatives to improve conditions for all users along the corridor.

The next step in the process will be to analyze the feedback received at these workshops, previous study session with the City Council, and the Four Corners Working Group. A final report will be prepared for the Four Corners governing bodies in the next few weeks. Upon approval of the preferred alternative, the four partners will begin the process of identifying funding opportunities for implementation of these improvements.

## Street Light Replacement Program

The City is in the process of replacing all street lighting with LED fixtures.

**Streets Division**

- Marked out 22 Underground Service Alerts
- Dug out 32.68 tons of alligated asphalt and tree roots in front of 612 Southview Court
- Hauled in and compacted 15 tons of baserock
- Applied and rolled 25 1/5 tons of hot asphalt
- Dug out 49.45 tons of alligated asphalt and tree roots in front of 604 Southview Court
- Hauled in and compacted 21 tons of baserock
- Filled potholes on Holly Road

**Storm Division**

- Performed twice-weekly inspection of Water Dog Lake roadway, dam, v-ditch, and dock
- Swept 137 miles of roadway capturing 10.27 tons of debris
- Inspected and cleaned Harbor Storm Pump Station and Ralston Storm Pump Station
- Cleaned 800 feet of storm pipe and removed 9 yards of material
- Inspected 261 feet of storm pipe
- Inspected 31 full-capture trash devices
- Conducted cigarette butt litter assessments at 5 locations: Belmont Sports Complex/Conference Center, O'Neill trail-south, El Camino at Ralston, Fifth Avenue Parking Lot, and Old County Road (*Pictured below*)

## **HELP KEEP OUR SEWER PUMPS HUMMING ALONG - Sewer Pump Gets Covered in Trash**



On Monday, May 27th, the Public Works Sewer Maintenance crew conducted preventative maintenance on 4 sewer pump stations to minimize the potential of pump failures due to clogging.

At the Motel 6 Pump Station, staff pulled a trash-laden pump, cleared the entangled debris and conducted a routine check of the impellor, wear ring, and other parts and components. Cleaning these pumps of foreign debris can be time consuming. Sewer staff takes additional precautionary measures to assure their

safety when cleaning debris from the pumps, as needles can be found in the excessive pile of waste that should not be flushed.

Toilet paper and human waste are the only objects that should be flushed. Other foreign matter weaves its way through the sewer system and ends up in the sewer pump stations, often clogging the pumps and creating havoc in the system. Once trash is flushed, the sewer line is vulnerable to clogging, as these materials can get caught on roots or other foreign objects in the pipeline, which can lead to sanitary sewer overflows from these pipe blockages. These can be lead to costly repairs and harm to our natural environment.

Toilets are not trash cans. Instead of flushing wipes and other foreign objects down the toilet, **please toss them in the trash.**

# City-wide Root Foaming

- 50,000 feet of sewer main throughout the city will be treated with root foam.
- Root control is an important element of an effective overall strategy to maintain sewer systems.
- Dukes Root Foaming (City's contractor) will be conducting the root foaming.
- Anticipated completion date is mid-May, 2015

**Earth Day Celebration at Twin Pines Park**



Saturday, April 25<sup>th</sup> marked Public Works Fourth Annual Earth Day Celebration at Twin Pines Park. The event housed numerous activities related to eco-friendly awareness.

Packed nicely into a 3-hour event, 146 event-goers stopped by the Meadow to learn about air quality, water and energy conservation, sustainability, growing organic, bee-friendly/drought-tolerant landscaping, recycling information, reuse, watershed information, rebate information, compost, water pollution prevention, air quality, vector & vector-born disease, bike-share, community choice aggregation program efforts, clean energy, green recycling and more!



Kids had an opportunity to participate in the Wacky Watershed activities, made seed balls, and participated in the Q & A's of storm water pollution prevention in the prize wheel spin! The Menchie's Yogurt Cone was onsite for the kids to have their photo taken.

In addition to the great booths and activities, several stations were available for residents to drop off their E-waste, document shredding, book recycling, household batteries, and fluorescent tubes. Free compost was available for residents as well.

So, how much E-waste and document shredding did we see this year? Here is how it all stacked up:

**E-Waste Collection Totals**

A total of **3,205 lbs of E-waste**, **354 feet** of florescent tubes, and **128 units** of light bulbs were collected as follows:

- CRT's (monitors): 8 units weighing 626 lbs.
- Flat Screens: 12 units weighing 188 lbs.
- CPU's(computers): 269 lbs.
- Laptops: 17 lbs.
- Misc. e-waste: 2,006 lbs.
- Cell Phones: 14 lbs.
- Florescent Tubes: 354 total feet of tubes (11-2 ft. tubes, 83-4ft. tubes)
- Light Bulbs (CFL's and incandescent): 128 units
- Batteries: 85 lbs.




