

California Local Revenue Measure Results - November 2016 Preliminary Report

The League of California Cities Financial Consultant and Belmont's own, Michael Coleman, released a preliminary report on Tuesday's election, which showed voters favorably supporting local tax and bond measures. Voters approved over \$32 billion facility bonds, including \$23 billion in school construction bonds and \$7.2 billion in transit and other local public facility improvements. The results indicate a continuing confidence in local government in California and the importance of the services provided by cities, counties, special districts and schools. Local measure experts Fairbank Maslin, Mullin and Metz observed, *"Voters see these local measures as effective mechanisms for addressing key issues, needs and concerns that they feel are going unmet or underfunded. Our research consistently shows that across California in a wide range of communities the public has a strong desire to invest locally, be it improving roads, transportation systems and infrastructure, building homeless shelters, repairing and upgrading neighborhood schools, or taxing marijuana sales to fund vital local services. Unlike voting for a candidate or a statewide ballot proposition that would implement a new policy, local ballot measures provide voters with a tangible way to get something done where they live."*

Belmont's Measure I a ½ cent local sales tax proposal, also known as the Belmont Streets and City Services Measure, passed with 55.1% support. [Measure I](#)

Comprehensive Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan

On November 9, 2016, City staff presented the final draft of the Plan to Council to collect feedback. The purpose of the Plan is to create a safe, comfortable, pedestrian and bicycle friendly environment which will encourage people of all ages to bike or walk. The Comprehensive Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan is consistent with the City's Complete Streets Policy adopted in January 2013, the Belmont-Redwood Shores Safe Routes to School Study prepared in 2012, the CCAG Congestion Management Plan prepared in 2011, San Mateo County Comprehensive Bicycle/Pedestrian Plan prepared in 2011 and a Ralston Avenue Corridor Study.

The goals of the CPBMP are as follows:

- Support adopted citywide, regional and State goals related to the provision of complete streets, and assist in implementing the City's Complete Streets Policy (CSP) adopted in January 2013.
- Assess pedestrian and bicycle conditions on a citywide basis.
- Identify key deficiencies and prioritize projects where safety and mode switch are encouraged.
- Guide the City's future investments in pedestrian and bicycle facilities.
- Promote multimodal transportation infrastructure that accommodates all users.
- Provide the City with a strategic resource that aids in developing citywide pedestrian and bicycle networks.
- Increase the rate of walking and bicycling in Belmont.
- Decrease child obesity rate by promoting walking/biking to schools

As part of the Plan, staff conducted an extensive outreach to various groups. A Stakeholder Advisory Group (SAG) consisting of representative from the Business, Residential and School communities was formed to review and guide the efforts to develop the Plan. The SAG met on a regular basis and discussed progress of various stages of the project. The project was also presented four times to the City's Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) to get input and guidance.

Parking Traffic and Safety Committee

The Parking Traffic and Safety Committee (PTSC) is available to residents to help address parking and traffic concerns in their neighborhood. Residents may submit their concern or recommendation to the PTSC who will evaluate the request based on current policy, regulations, and existing traffic data in the area. The PTSC will also perform field investigations as required. Typical items considered by the PTSC include installation of stop signs, red curbs, streetlights and speed humps, as well as the placement of advisory signs and crosswalks.

Any proposed solution or recommendation will require notification to residents in the area and the item will be placed on a PTSC meeting agenda. Nearby residents may express their support or opposition to an item and offer additional information or input by attending the meeting, or contacting the PTSC via email or phone. Some traffic related items such as the installation of red curb require City Council approval. After review of such items and input from nearby residents, the PTSC will make a recommendation to the City Council for approval. Ralston Avenue Pedestrian Improvement Project Update

Construction of the pedestrian improvements on Ralston Avenue continues. Concrete work is nearly complete. Asphalt concrete work adjacent to gutters and driveways have started. Next week, backfilling and hydro seeding will take place. Utility box adjustments are currently being scheduled. Once completed, the project will provide a continuous and safe pedestrian sidewalk from South Road to the NDNU entrance by installing new sidewalk and new retaining walls. Traffic Operations

The Traffic Operations Division has been working three main projects:

1. The annual re-painting of approximately 43,000 feet of red curb throughout the city. We have finished 30,884 feet and need about 12,000 more feet to complete.
2. Staff replace the lane markings and street legends on South Road (*pictured below*). We have installed all of the Bots Dots and reflectors, and will be replacing the thermoplastic street legends soon.



3. The pump station annual electrical testing and inspection of the City's 11 wastewater and 2 storm water pumping stations. This work requires the operation of all electrical and electro-mechanical devices at each station to ensure proper operation. To date, we have completed these inspections on 8 wastewater pumping stations and 1 storm water pumping station.

- 4. This week, staff manufactured 9 new signs and installed 2 new sign poles (*pictured below*). These signs were knocked down by errant drivers.



Streets Division

Anita Court Pavement Maintenance

The Public Works Street division has been performing pavement maintenance on Anita Court. The past week, staff dug-out 34.59 tons of alligated asphalt and put down 17.48 tons of hot asphalt.



Crews have concentrated their maintenance efforts on streets that have a pavement condition Class between 60 and 80.

Anita Court has a Pavement Condition Class of 61 (see Pavement Condition Class chart below)

<u>PCI Range</u>	<u>Pavement Condition Class</u>
70-100	Good (I) Shows slight or moderate distress requiring mostly preventative, life extending maintenance
60-69	Fair (II) Worn to the point where minor rehabilitation is necessary
50-59	At-Risk (III) Worn to the point where the pavement surface requires major rehabilitation or reconstruction
25-49	Poor (IV) Pavement surface has failed and requires reconstruction
0-24	Failed (V) Pavement and sub-base have failed and require reconstruction

Driving Lane Closure and lane shifts



The Ralston Avenue Pedestrian Improvement Project is now underway. Construction is currently taking place on Ralston Avenue between South Road and the east NDNU driveway entrance. Construction will require the shifting of the westbound traffic lane and removing the center two-way left turn lanes. Left turns into driveways within the project limits will not be permitted. This traffic lane reconfiguration will be implemented 24 hours a day, 7 days a week throughout the duration of construction. Please anticipate delays and plan your routes accordingly.

Shrubs and plants were trimmed and weeds were removed in these medians. Graffiti was also removed from several surfaces at the Library.



CALTRANS COMPLETES INNOVATIVE SAN MATEO COUNTY 101/82 SMART CORRIDOR Project Uses Technology Improvements to Battle Congestion on the Peninsula

San Mateo County –Caltrans and the City/County Association of Governments of San Mateo County (C/CAG) hosted a ribbon cutting event today to celebrate the completion of the U.S. Highway 101/State Route 82 Smart Corridor Project, a new integrated network using technologically-advanced tools to better manage traffic along the U.S. 101, SR-82 (El Camino Real) and the major local arterials from San Bruno to East Palo Alto.

“SMART corridors are a valuable tool in helping our existing transportation system be more efficient,” said Caltrans Director Malcolm Dougherty. “Using this technology to optimize and manage traffic in collaboration with local partners can improve travel times and safety for all roadway users.”

This \$35 million dollar project uses the latest traffic management technology along 20 miles of SR-82 and on local streets in San Mateo County. These devices include upgraded controllers, closed circuit television cameras and Trail Blazer signs, all connected through fiber optic cables linking 10 adjacent cities along the corridor. This integrated communication system will provide real-time information to local traffic engineers for day-to-day traffic management and operators in the Caltrans Transportation Management Center (TMC) in Oakland. The system will also help manage local traffic impacts resulting from major traffic incidents along U.S. 101 in San Mateo County.

“This project allows traffic professionals to effectively manage any incident on U.S. 101 and reduce delays on this corridor,” said Bijan Sartipi, Caltrans District 4 Director. “The project proves once again that by partnering with local agencies, we can resolve the traffic congestion issues on both freeways and local streets.”

“The data captured by the Smart Corridor’s Intelligent Transportation Systems will help motorists have a smoother drive in San Mateo County,” said State Senator Jerry Hill, D-San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties. “Drivers will receive real-time information on the options they’ll have during traffic incidents and other circumstances that can severely affect traffic flow – which will be a great advantage on our busy roadways.”

Caltrans’ partners for the project include San Mateo County Transportation Authority, C/CAG, County of San Mateo, and the cities of San Mateo, San Bruno, San Carlos, Belmont, Redwood City, Atherton, Menlo Park, Millbrae, Burlingame and East Palo Alto.
