2018/19 Council Priorities

On February 12th the City Council held a priority workshop where they reviewed the existing Council Priorities for 2017/18 and established priorities for 2018/19. The Council reconfirmed a number of priorities and identified four specific priorities to be focused on for the next year. The top priorities identified by the Council are:

- 1. *Economic Development, Downtown Revitalization and Affordable Housing***
 - Implementation of the 2035 General Plan (GP) & Belmont Village Specific Plan (BVSP)
 - Affordable Housing Program
 - Downtown Economic Development

- 2. *Pavement (Measure I & Sb1) And Major Transportation Improvements***
 - Continuation of the 2014 Council adopted Ralston Ave Corridor plan and the Share the Roads Policy for optimal pedestrian, bicycle and vehicle use.
 - Development of a Capital Improvement Plan for Alameda De Las Pulgas and a funding strategy for corridor improvements.
 - Completion of the initial Measure I and SB1 street improvements.

- 3. *Financing Plan for Infrastructure and Services***

Secure on-going funding for Sewer, Storm, Streets, Facilities, and Parks to address deferred maintenance and future capital needs along with a plan to support critical public services. Leverage available Measure I funding to advance infrastructure projects.

- 4. *Park and Recreation Improvements (Facilities and Parks)***
 - Athletic Field Improvements – Advance Synthetic Turf Project at the Sports Complex and collaborate with BRSSD on other athletic fields improvements.
 - Barrett Community Center Master Plan – Develop conceptual site plan with guidance from Council appointed Ad hoc Committee

The Council also identified a number of Policies that they want to work on in the coming year and they are included in the 2018/19 Council Priorities attached toward the end of this document.

Synthetic Turf at the Sports Complex

At the February 13th meeting, the City Council approved an agreement with Callander Associates to design and oversee construction of a synthetic turf surface on the North Field of the Belmont Sports Complex. In addition to installing the synthetic turf, dugouts will be modified for accessibility, new bullpens and a new batting cage will be installed, and the lighting will be improved.

The North field was selected for this project by the City's Sports Advisory Committee and the Parks & Recreation Commission because it already has field lights, plenty of park, no immediate neighbors and already hosts a wide range of youth and adult sports activities. Not only will public use of the facility be extended by 2 to 4 months each year depending upon the winter weather conditions, but the field will be able to host baseball, soccer, lacrosse, ultimate frisbee, or other activities of interest to our residents. The field will be safer, require less maintenance, save over 3 million gallons of water each year, and reduced other maintenance costs associated with a natural grass and dirt ballfield.

Callander Associates will provide the City with a construction cost estimate, once the design work is complete. Funds from this project will come from Parks-in-Lieu fees – developer fees that may only be used to increase the City's parks system. No general fund dollars are anticipated to be used on this project.

Construction Projects around Town

An ancillary benefit of the lack of rain in 2018 is the progress made on the significant construction projects around town. All have taken advantage of the dry weather to move rapidly forward.

Here is what these projects look in the second month of the New Year:

Autobahn Motors (700 Island Parkway)

The auto dealership was issued a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy on February 8th and was open to the public for President's Day. There are a few remaining items to complete before a final Certificate of Occupancy is issued and the permit finalized.



Homewood Suites (1201 Shoreway Road)

The exterior of the building is weather-tight condition. The mechanical, electrical, and plumbing work is underway and a tap was recently completed for the water supply (including fire sprinklers) to the building.

76 Gas Station, Car Wash & Mini-Mart (1001 Old County Road)

The exterior work for the construction of the mini-mart, drive-through car wash, and fuel islands is nearing completion; the fuel tanks have been installed. Work on the mechanical, electrical, and plumbing installations is underway at the interior of the buildings. Completion is expected in late March.



Merry Moppet (2400 Merry Moppet Lane)

Now that the shoring of Merry Moppet Lane and the mass excavation is completed, the foundation work for the new academic building is well underway.



Regis Homes (400 El Camino Real)

Both the north and south residential buildings are now weather-tight. The mechanical, electrical, plumbing and fire sprinkler work is well underway at both residential buildings. The framing for the corner commercial retail building is completed and weather-proofing the exterior has started.

CHS Development Group (600 El Camino Real)

Both stories of wood framing are now complete. Efforts to weather-proof the building are underway. Plumbing and fire sprinkler contractors are on the jobsite.






Belmont Named Tree City USA for 11th Consecutive Year

For the 11th consecutive year, the City of Belmont has been named a Tree City USA. The Tree City USA program, sponsored by the National Arbor Day Foundation in cooperation with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service, recognizes communities throughout the nation that commit to maintaining and developing their urban forest.

Belmont met all four standards required to become a Tree City USA: A tree board or department responsible for the care of all trees on city-owned property; a tree care ordinance that provides good policy and serves as the foundation for a tree care program; an annual budget to support the tree program; and an annual Arbor Day program to celebrate the benefits of city trees, such as providing clean air and clean water, decreasing soil erosion, providing shade, and increasing property values.

One major point of the City Council's Vision Statement is "Natural Beauty", emphasizing our beautiful hills, trees, parks, views and open spaces. Achieving Tree City USA status for more than a decade is affirmation that this vision is being accomplished.

Parks

Field maintenance continues at multiple locations throughout Belmont this week. Turf renovations were conducted at Barrett Community Center. Both the sports turf field and ornamental lawns were renovated with fresh soil and then top seeded and fertilized. Part of the renovation work included an audit of the irrigation systems and several repairs were made.

General repairs were made at the Sports Complex as Opening Day nears. At Marina Field, infield repairs were made to the irrigation system and pitcher's mound. A new rope was installed on the flag pole. Weeds and undesirable vegetation was removed from the field perimeter. On South Field, the amplifier system was replaced with a newer model. The dugouts and drains were also cleared and cleaned on the South Field.


Project Update (2-23-18)

PG&E continues to work on clearances for electrical energization. PG&E has also begun partial restoration on Masonic Way (between Granada St. & Old County Rd.) and O'Neill Ave. (between Elmer St. & Old County Rd.) to clear out as much of their work as possible. This is to give way to other utility companies (i.e. AT&T, CableCom) who are still working on their cable lines and for the City's Old County Road Street Light Improvements Project. The Old County Road Street Light Project will begin soon to install new street light poles and to maintain lighting in the area. PG&E will be removing the wooden poles in approximately 3-4 months upon completion of the overall project. Old County Rd., Masonic Way, and O'Neill Ave. may have lane closures with flaggers on site.



The City understands that this project causes inconveniences for residents during the construction period. Your patience and understanding are greatly appreciated.

MPWD AND CITY OF BELMONT COORDINATE A JOINT CAPITAL PROJECT FOR WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS

Officials Cite Efficient Use of Public Resources As One of Many Benefits to Residents

BELMONT, CA (February, 2018) – The Mid-Peninsula Water District (MPWD) and the City of Belmont (City) finalized a joint agreement for working together on three significant capital infrastructure projects during FY 2018/2019. That agreement, signed during the first week of January 2018, reinforced the cooperative professional working relationship and coordination between the two agencies and promoted the efficient uses of public resources during engineering design, construction, and project management. “This agreement is a win-win for the shared customers and for public agency resources. It represents a dedication by both agencies to serve the community through operational and fiscal efficiencies,” said MPWD General Manager Tammy Rudock. The agreement covers the replacement of MPWD’s water system, and Belmont’s sewer system and roadwork, in the following areas:

■ **North Road / Davey Glen Road**

MPWD: Abandonment of an aging cross country water main and replacement of 1,400 LF of water main along Davey Glen Road.

CITY: Trenchless replacement of 1,200 LF of sewer main and associated structures, replacement of 16 LF of storm drain pipe, and one-inch overlay pavement restoration along the length of the utilities construction.

■ **Francis Avenue / Court**

MPWD: Replacement of 830 LF of PVS water main and addition of fire hydrant at end of Francis Court.

CITY: Construction of 792 LF of new sewer main and associated structures, abandonment of 409 LF of existing sewer main, four-inch pavement reconstruction, and slurry sealing along the length of the utilities construction.

■ **Academy Avenue / Belburn Drive**

MPWD: Abandonment of 600 LF of PVS water main on Academy Avenue and relocation of 22 service connections, and replacement of 150 LF of PVS water main on Belburn Drive.

CITY: Construction of 714 LF of new sewer main and associated structures, trenchless replacement of 317 LF of sewer main in easements, abandonment of 543 LF of existing sewer main, two-inch overlay pavement restoration, and slurry sealing along the length of the utilities construction.

Belmont's Public Works Director, Afshin Oskoui, echoed Rudock's comments that, "Both teams were committed to ensuring development of a program that would set the stage for future joint projects, in order to minimize impacts to residents and visitors in Belmont and cost-effectively utilize resources."

Belmont's City Manager, Greg Scoles, commended the spirit of the partnership between the two agencies, and said, "This project exemplifies how we can work together to minimize costs and maximize benefits to the residents of our communities."

SOLID WASTE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

- Extend the existing solid waste Franchise Agreement with Recology of San Mateo County in accordance with the terms of the current Franchise Agreement (PW/FN)

ADA TRANSITION PLAN

- Update the City's ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) Self-Evaluation and Transition Plan, which addresses City programs, activities and services, identifies problems or physical barriers that may limit access by people with disabilities. The updated plan would bring the City into compliance and would identify solutions, provide recommendations, costs and schedules for the removal of barriers to City provided programs (CM/PW)

VOLUNTEERS

- Develop a city-wide volunteer program that encourages volunteerism in the City (HR/CA)

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- Consider formation of an ad hoc Economic Development Committee and consider an economic development specialist (FN/CM)

PUBLIC ART AND PLACEMAKING

- Have the ad hoc Placemaking Subcommittee evaluate entry point and neighborhood identification, wayfinding improvements, local history markers and art on utility boxes (PR/PW)

BLOCK GRANTS for NONPROFITS

- Develop a grant program for local non-profit organizations (FN)
