The City Council is considering adopting a resolution that would strengthen the City's commitment to public safety and would support comprehensive action to protect all people from gun violence. The draft resolution is broadly consistent with prior actions by the Council seeking to promote public safety and it promotes reasonable, common sense comprehensive measures to address gun violence and proper funding of mental health services, substance abuse treatment programs, domestic violence programs, and suicide prevention. Road Work Ahead – 2017 Pavement Condition Report and 5-Year Paving Plan Presented to the City Council

On Tuesday May 8, 2018, staff provided an [update](#) to the City Council on the 2017 Pavement Condition Report ([PCI Report](#)) and 5-Year (2019-2023) Paving Plan. The City Council and community have identified street maintenance as a high priority related to infrastructure renewal, and Measure I funding.



Belmont's Measure I, and the State's passage of Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) is providing additional road maintenance funds. Because of these measures the Public Works Department is now in a position to implement a more robust pavement preservation program to stretch available dollars in the most effective way and to begin a long-term pavement capital improvement plan.



Pavement Condition Report


The 2017 PCI update indicates that the City's overall PCI has increased 3 points, from 56 in 2014, to 59 in 2017. A few factors increased the PCI including the following:

- The City of Belmont's Streets Maintenance crew has been executing an aggressive Preventative Maintenance program, over the past 2 years.
- A number of street sections have areas that were required to be patched or repaved in connection with new development or utility projects.
- MTC revised their test method and split Weathering and Raveling, to stay in alignment with ASTM D6433 standards. This required a minor adjustment to how the PCI's were calculated, which resulted in slight PCI shifts.

Five Year Paving Program

In previous years, the City had limited funding for residential surface seal programs, pavement repairs, and paving on arterial streets. Given the passage of both Measure I and SB 1, these new funding sources provide an annual funding estimate of about \$1.6 to \$1.7 million for pavement maintenance, which equates to a funding estimate of \$8.5 million available over the next 5 years. In addition, the City Council has allocated \$2.0 million in Infrastructure funds to further assist the program. The City is planning for \$10.5 million in street maintenance repairs for the proposed 5-Year Paving Plan. The Department prepared a working list of streets for a five year pavement construction plan as discussed in the [Five-Year Paving Capital Improvement Program Development Report](#). The funding is aimed to be distributed evenly throughout the five-year period, at approximately \$2.1 million per year.

The proposed \$10.5 million in funding falls short of what is required to bring all streets into good condition, but the overall street network will improve to a PCI of 61 while moving some of the Poor and Very Poor streets into a Good condition. This plan provides the department with a road map to allocate its resources to address community's need for improved infrastructure.



This year marks the City of Belmont's 10th year in participating in ***Bike to Work Day***. The City along with the Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition hosted an Energizer Station at the Belmont CalTrain station from 6:30 AM – 9:15 AM. 172 bicyclists rode-by; and 62 stopped to reenergize before continuing on their commute.

Why is tracking the number of bicyclists who ride by or stop by the energizer station so important? It helps to demonstrate the growth in bicycle commuting each year; and is critical in efforts to support investment in bicycling infrastructure. These numbers verify and validate the effectiveness of all of our efforts in producing Bike to Work Day to our supporting agencies.

The San Mateo County Office of Sustainability performs an annual bike/pedestrian count and some of the station locations correspond to their count locations. Some of the counts can be compared to their non-BTWD counts and possibly indicate the effect of BTWD on bike traffic.

Thank you to City staff: Michael M. (Parks & Recreation); Carlos D. (Community Development); Cora D. (Human Resources); Paul W. (Silicon Valley Bicycle Coalition) and Gladwyn D. (Belmont resident) who staffed the Energizer table, welcomed the bicyclists to our City, provided encouragement and support, and distributed Musette bags to bicyclists which included bicycle related information and goodies. An added treat was getting a slice of the awesome coffee cake from Hobee's, Belmont restaurant. Delish!!

Construction Projects and Updates



Union 76 Gas Station

This new gas station at the corner of Ralston Avenue and Old County Road has completed all concrete flatwork and is being preparing for wiring of the gas pumps at the islands. The new mini mart is in the finishing stages with the above T-bar inspections to commence shortly.

400 El Camino Real

All rough inspections of the North and South buildings are completed for this residential/commercial development. In progress are the inspections for drywall, and exterior stucco. The retail shell has achieved rough framing; the exterior shear walls and roof diaphragm have been recently completed. The South building units are in progress with exterior finishes and will soon be available to be shown for sales.



600 El Camino Real

This mixed use residential/commercial project completed all shearwall and roofing inspections. In progress are the window installations, mechanical duct piping, and corridor wiring. Additional rough inspections which include plumbing, electrical and mechanical should be scheduled soon.

Hilton Homesuites Hotel - 1201 Shoreway Road

This new hotel is in the process of their rough inspection completion and their window and exterior sheathing installations. Corridors will be the first areas to receive their insulation and first layer of drywall after the rough electrical inspections are completed.



The Old County Road Utility Undergrounding District Project



Project Update (5-11-18)

PG&E and their subcontractors have completed all the electrical conversions on private properties. A delay in clearance was encountered, so the removal of overhead lines and pole tops is anticipated to occur soon. Once the work is confirmed, notifications will be posted; since night work has been requested in order to minimize community impacts and traffic congestion. Noise level will be minimal in accordance to the City Ordinance.

Also, PG&E has been working with property owners for the overhead de-energization. The property owners who will be affected, have been notified. PG&E began sidewalk restoration and are scheduled to start restoring streets in early June upon completion of the entire project. Other communication utilities will follow after PG&E has completed work and demobilized from the site.

In conjunction with the undergrounding, Tennyson Electric continues with the streetlight construction for the Old County Road Street Light Project, which maintains lighting and safety in the area. Street light poles along Masonic Way and Old County Road have been installed. Restoration of the street continues as the street light poles are still being worked on.


The Old County Road Street Light Project and the Utility Underground Project are scheduled to be completed at the end of May and June, respectively.

Old County Rd. (between Masonic Way and Harbor Blvd.) and Masonic Way (between Granada St. and Old County Rd.) may have lane closures with flaggers or traffic control on site. Through traffic is to be maintained.

The City understands that this project causes inconveniences for residents during the construction period. Your patience and understanding are greatly appreciated. City-Wide Sanitary Sewer Root Foaming Maintenance

In an ongoing effort to conduct preventative maintenance on the City's sanitary sewer mains, approximately 50,000 feet of sewer main throughout the city will be treated with root foam starting the week of May 1st, 2018. Root control is an important element of an effective overall strategy to maintain sewer systems. Dukes Root Foaming (City's contractor) will notify residents if they need access to an easement on their property. On Friday May 4 we celebrated Cinco de Mayo early, the children enjoyed beating the piñatas for treats and snack on tortilla chips with salsa.




Teen Zone


