Memorial Day Holiday – City Hall Closed

Council Adopts a Resolution Strengthening the City's Commitment to Public Safety and Supporting Comprehensive Action to Protect All People from Gun Violence

At last Tuesday's Council meeting the Council adopted a resolution that strengthens the City's commitment to public safety and supports comprehensive action to protect all people from gun violence. The resolution is broadly consistent with prior actions by the Council seeking to promote public safety and it promotes reasonable, common sense comprehensive measures to address gun violence and proper funding of mental health services, substance abuse treatment programs, domestic violence programs, and suicide prevention. Road Work Ahead – 2017 Pavement Condition Report and 5-Year Paving Plan Presented to the City Council

On Tuesday May 8, 2018, staff provided an [update](#) to the City Council on the 2017 Pavement Condition Report ([PCI Report](#)) and 5-Year (2019-2023) Paving Plan. The City Council and community have identified street maintenance as a high priority related to infrastructure renewal, and Measure I funding.



Belmont's Measure I, and the State's passage of Senate Bill 1 (SB 1) is providing additional road maintenance funds. Because of these measures the Public Works Department is now in a position to implement a more robust pavement preservation program to stretch available dollars in the most effective way and to begin a long-term pavement capital improvement plan.



Pavement Condition Report

The 2017 PCI update indicates that the City's overall PCI has increased 3 points, from 56 in 2014, to 59 in 2017. A few factors increased the PCI including the following:

- The City of Belmont's Streets Maintenance crew has been executing an aggressive Preventative Maintenance program, over the past 2 years.
- A number of street sections have areas that were required to be patched or repaved in connection with new development or utility projects.
- MTC revised their test method and split Weathering and Raveling, to stay in alignment with ASTM D6433 standards. This required a minor adjustment to how the PCI's were calculated, which resulted in slight PCI shifts.

Five Year Paving Program

In previous years, the City had limited funding for residential surface seal programs, pavement repairs, and paving on arterial streets. Given the passage of both Measure I and SB 1, these new funding sources provide an annual funding estimate of about \$1.6 to \$1.7 million for pavement maintenance, which equates to a funding estimate of \$8.5 million available over the next 5 years. In addition, the City Council has allocated \$2.0 million in Infrastructure funds to further assist the program. The City is planning for \$10.5 million in street maintenance repairs for the proposed 5-Year Paving Plan. The Department prepared a working list of streets for a five year pavement construction plan as discussed in the [Five-Year Paving Capital Improvement Program Development Report](#). The funding is aimed to be distributed evenly throughout the five-year period, at approximately \$2.1 million per year.

The proposed \$10.5 million in funding falls short of what is required to bring all streets into good condition, but the overall street network will improve to a PCI of 61 while moving some of the Poor and Very Poor streets into a Good condition. This plan provides the department with a road map to allocate its resources to address community's need for improved infrastructure.



Preparing for Wildfire Season

As we approach the summer months, the Belmont Fire Department wants to remind residents that wildfire season is approaching. As part of this effort, the Department is providing the following information to residents throughout the community;

- Informational Postcards have been distributed to residences in the wildland urban interface (WUI) with the reminder to remove any dead or dying vegetation and to create a defensible space between their property and any grass, trees and/or shrubs that surround it.
- Parks staff continue to partner with the California Department of Forestry (Cal Fire) in reducing vegetation in the open space areas with Conservation Camp crews.

Engineering Update:

Sanitary Sewer and Water Rehabilitation Project

As part of City's ongoing sewer capital replacement program to tackle aging and deteriorated sanitary sewer infrastructure and Mid-Peninsula Water District (MPWD) capital improvement program, the City has contracted with K.J. Woods to rehabilitate defective and failing sewer and water mains located throughout the City. The project also includes manhole rehabilitation, sewer lateral reconnections, water valves, water service laterals, and fire hydrants. Construction of the project will begin on May 29, 2018 and should be completed by fall 2018.

Work will start on Davey Glen Road and will involve water main replacement. The street will be closed to through traffic. No Parking signs will be posted. Residents have been notified.

Ralston Sewer Rehabilitation Project Phase II

Ralston Sewer Rehabilitation Project Phase II is starting on May 30th. The project is expected to be finished in September 2017. City Contractor, EPS, Inc. will be upsizing a sewer main line along Ralston Avenue between Coronet Blvd and Notre Dame Avenue, conduct various spot repairs, and install a new sewer line on Hiller Street between Masonic and Wessex Way. The project also includes sewer lateral reconnections and manhole rehabilitation/construction. In the next couple of weeks the contractor will survey, pothole and video inspect the sewer mains. Residents will be notified.

Public Works Open House Update

The Belmont Public Works Department hosted an Open House on Wednesday, May 23, in celebration of National Public Works Week. The Open House took place in The Meadow, at City Hall, and over 200 first and second graders from Nesbit Elementary School attended.

Included in the festivities were a street and traffic display, Public Works completed projects and upcoming projects display, a miniature model of the City of Belmont at the Mid-Peninsula Water booth, Recology of San Mateo County booth, a free BBQ, and fun interactive games for the kids.

Public Works, Mid-Peninsula Water, and Recology of San Mateo County, all displayed and handed out important environmental information including fun giveaways for the kids.

The Old County Road Utility Undergrounding District Project



Project Update (5-25-18)

PG&E achieved a major project milestone in de-energizing overhead high-voltage lines and energizing the new underground cable system. The removal of overhead lines and pole tops is anticipated to occur soon. PG&E is also scheduling street restoration work. PG&E's work for the Utility Underground Project is scheduled to be finished at the end of June.

In conjunction with the undergrounding, Tennyson Electric also continues with the streetlight construction for the Old County Road Street Light Project, which maintains lighting and safety in the area. Street light poles along Masonic Way and Old County Road have been installed. Tennyson's construction and restoration is expected to be complete by May 31st.

Other communication utilities will follow after PG&E has completed work and demobilized from the site. Work for communication utilities and the removal of the remaining wooden poles is anticipated to be completed at the end of September.

Old County Rd. (between Masonic Way and Harbor Blvd.) and Masonic Way (between Granada St. and Old County Rd.) may have lane closures with flaggers or traffic control on site. Through traffic is to be maintained.

Parks and Recreation

Memorial Day Closure

Irrigation work was completed at Cipriani Park this week. An aging backflow prevention device was replaced. Backflow prevention devices prevent irrigation water from running back in to the water supply. This particular device began leaking due to corrosion and would not pass inspection. The device was replaced and water was restored to the field. In the process of making the repairs a leaking irrigation valve was discovered and replaced. An onsite audit of the entire system was conducted, making adjustments to the sprinkler heads for optimum performance.



At Hallmark Park, general maintenance was performed and a new tennis court net was installed. The net was replaced due to vandalism. While onsite, staff made several adjustments to the irrigation system.

City of Belmont has a Local Minimum Wage Starting in July

EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2018

Beginning July 1, 2018, employers who are subject to the Belmont Business License Tax OR who maintain a facility in Belmont must pay to each employee who performs at least two (2) hours of work per week in Belmont, minimum wages not less than \$12.50 per hour.

The minimum wage requirement set forth in the Belmont Minimum Wage Ordinance applies to adult AND minor employees who work two (2) or more hours per week (tips not included). Beginning January 1, 2019 the Belmont minimum wage will be \$13.50, January 1, 2020 it will be \$15.00, January 1, 2021 it will be \$15.90, and annually thereafter the Belmont minimum wage will be adjusted based on the Regional Consumer Price Index.

Under the Ordinance, employees who assert their rights to receive the City's minimum wage are protected from retaliation. Employees may file a civil lawsuit against their employers for any violation of the Ordinance or may file a complaint with the City of Belmont. The City will investigate possible violations and will require access to payroll records. The City will enforce violations of the minimum wage ordinance by ordering reinstatement of employees, payment of back wages unlawfully withheld and penalties.

Fast Facts: SamTrans US-101 Express Bus Feasibility Study

What is an express bus?

An express bus is a transit service that is designed to travel faster than traditional "local" services to popular commuter destinations. They typically offer faster travel times by traveling on freeways and making fewer stops. The most likely passengers of express buses are weekday commuters or other passengers traveling somewhat long distances between cities. The express bus services SamTrans is exploring would be open to all passengers.

What is this study?

SamTrans is studying the possibility of new express bus service through San Mateo County, to San Francisco and Santa Clara counties, with some routes potentially running in a managed lane on US-101. This study includes research and analysis of the potential bus service, as well as a public engagement process to hear from potential riders, advocacy organizations, and other local stakeholders. The study team will compile research, analysis, and the results of the community input into a Final Report, anticipated in Fall 2018.

Why are we doing this study?

US-101 is one of the most congested freeways in the Bay Area, and express buses can play a role in providing an easy alternative to driving alone and strengthening connectivity to jobs and housing hubs. Express buses would be just one part of the solution to easing commutes on US-101. Together with other transportation improvements along the corridor, express bus service has the potential to help improve travel conditions and options.

Is this the same as the San Mateo US-101 Managed Lanes Project?

No. While the projects are related, the US-101 Express Bus Feasibility Study complements but is separate from the San Mateo US-101 Managed Lanes Project. The San Mateo US-101 Managed Lanes Project is a feasibility study for implementing a continuous managed traffic lane along the US-101 corridor, whereas the US-101 Express Bus Feasibility Study will examine the financial and operational feasibility of long-distance express buses operating on US-101, serving San Mateo County and adjacent counties. Ultimately, new express bus services along US-101 might be one of several transportation options that helps to maximize the benefit of managed lanes on 101.

What's happening and when?

SamTrans launched this study in April 2017. The Study team has since completed a detailed market analysis and identified an initial set of 15 potential express bus routes throughout the three-county study area. The initial routes were evaluated against a set of goals and performance metrics such as anticipated ridership.

The study team is currently completing a detailed evaluation process of the routes, after which the team anticipates recommending a network of four to six express bus routes to be implemented in phases. The study's final report is anticipated to be published in Fall 2018. SamTrans is exploring a potential pilot launch of express buses prior to the year 2021 with a full launch in conjunction with the completion of the US-101 Managed Lanes project. The new express service will be funded in part through SB1 funds.

We welcome stakeholder input throughout the project. The study team held a round of outreach in Summer 2017 and is holding a second round in Summer 2018 with the events to the right.
