Re-Launched Household Battery and Cell Phone Collection Program

Batteries power our daily lives, but eventually reach their end of life and must be disposed of properly. *It is illegal to put batteries in the trash.*

Single-Family Households



Starting **September 3, 2018**, residents in single-family homes in the RethinkWaste service area can place household batteries (i.e. rechargeable, alkaline, button) and cell phones in a sealed clear zip-top bag and place **on top of your black garbage cart** on your regular collection day. Please tape lithium-ion batteries and wrap cell phones in paper before placing in the zip-top bag.

Multi-Family Residents

Check to see if your building has a designated area for battery and cell phone collection. If you don't see one in a central location, contact your Property Manager to request a free [Recology San Mateo County Collection Bucket](#).



Property Managers

Establish a centrally located collection container at your property – a lobby, multi-use room, mail room or clubhouse – for residents to place their bagged batteries and cell phones, in a collection bucket provided at no charge by Recology San Mateo County. When you're ready to schedule a collection, place the bucket in the mutually agreed upon collection area and call Recology San Mateo County to schedule your free pickup.



Drop Off

Many local retailers also accept old batteries and cell phones for proper disposal. Please visit [RecycleStuff.org](#) for drop-off locations.

You may also drop off batteries and cell phones, along with other electronics, at the Shoreway Environmental Center at 333 Shoreway Road in San Carlos. More information at the end of this document and at this [LINK](#).

City Hall Lobby ADA Compliance/Customer Service Remodel Progress

Phase I (Construction) of this ADA compliance project is complete and construction crews have wrapped up, except for a few minor punch list items. A deep clean of the Lobby construction area was completed last weekend and the Police Department Lobby carpeting was installed. Painting continues on the 2nd and 3rd floors of City Hall and is nearing completion, as the Council Chambers, EOC and Police Department have been painted this week. ADA compliance upgrades have been completed in the Lobby bathrooms, tile work is complete, and once the fire alarms are installed next week, those restrooms will be open for public access.

Construction crews will be returning in mid-September to commence Phase II (Furniture and Finishes), as Permit Center workstations and furniture delivery is scheduled for September 21st. The Permit Center continues to be temporarily relocated to the 3rd Floor of City Hall until the completion of Phase II. Information regarding interim Permit Center accommodations are available on the City's website.

2018 California Coastal Cleanup Day – Belmont Creeks to Bay

City of Belmont is hosting its annual *Belmont Creeks to Bay* cleanup on Saturday, September 15, 9:00 AM to Noon.

Sign up will take place at 9:00 AM in front of City Hall (One Twin Pines Lane). Garbage and recycle retrieval supplies will be provided but volunteers are encouraged to bring their own buckets, bags, gloves, etc. A couple of the cleanup sites may be muddy, so bring boots or an old pair of shoes you don't mind getting dirty.

Three Cities Train for Emergencies

Earlier this week City Staff from San Mateo, Foster City, Belmont as well as Red Cross & CERT Volunteers participated in the "Yellow Command" Emergency Response Exercise. The exercise centered around emergency sheltering and involved the opening of the Belmont Emergency Operations Center at City Hall and a simulated shelter at the William Walker Recreation Center in



Foster City. In total 88 staff members and volunteers worked through emergency response and sheltering issues resulted from a major earthquake striking the Bay Area. This continues our ongoing joint emergency preparedness efforts through the newly forming San Mateo Consolidated Fire Department that will serve Belmont, Foster City and San Mateo.

Street Pavement Website

In an effort to improve information about the City's pavement program and projects in the coming years, the City is launching the new [Belmont Pavement Website](#). This site will be a location where you'll be able get information about all things related to pavement in one convenient location. We look forward to keeping the community informed about our work as we improve the City's aging infrastructure!

A few FAQs found on the site are:

Q: How does the City determine which streets to schedule for preventive maintenance work?

A: A computerized pavement management system is used to store the condition data of all roads. This system, known as StreetSaver, was developed by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and is helping Bay Area cities and counties. The system utilizes a computer model, which predicts the proper time to perform preventive maintenance work. To keep the system up to date, the City periodically surveys the condition of the City streets to determine the condition of the pavement and updates the condition data of all roads which are maintained in the model on regular bases. StreetSaver utilizes a model, which predicts the proper time to perform preventive maintenance work. The most cost-effective pavement maintenance application is selected based on the amount of funding available each year and street need.

Q: When will my street be resurfaced? Is my road going to be paved soon?

A: In order to maximize the dollars available to preserve its entire network of pavement in the best condition, the City relies on its pavement management system (StreetSaver) to preliminarily select candidate streets for further evaluation. Unfortunately, not all streets will be treated with the annual available funds. However, with the passage of Measure I, the City drafted a 5 year pavement program, which is the first part of the 30 year tax measure. This enabled us to evaluate all City streets. Streets not found on the initial draft list will be considered in the next cycle of the pavement program. Please note that maintenance of streets are tentatively scheduled in order to accommodate planning and design purposes, which may include utility coordination, inspection of drainage issues, addition of sidewalks, addition of bicycle and pedestrian pathways, etc.

Overview

The City is responsible for the operation, repair and maintenance of approximately 70 centerline miles (40 travel lane miles) of streets with a pavement replacement value of over \$227 million in present day (2018) dollars.

In November 2016, Belmont voters approved the Belmont Streets and City Services Measure (Measure 1), a half-cent general tax that generates approximately \$1.3 million annually for local infrastructure. The City Council has allocated \$156 per year towards street pavement beginning with Fiscal Year 2018.

Furthermore, on April 28, 2017, the Governor signed Senate Bill (SB) 1, which is funded by the newly established Road Maintenance and Rehabilitation Account (RMRA), which receives four sources of new revenue to address road maintenance, rehabilitation and critical safety needs on both the state highways and local streets and road system. RMRA sources of funds are increases to the per gallon fuel excise taxes, diesel fuel sales taxes, and vehicle registration fees and it provides for inflationary adjustments to tax rates in future years. City anticipates receiving \$1.066 in fiscal year 2018 and approximately \$600k-700k in future years as a result of this funding.

The first project to be funded with Measure 1 and SB1 funds is the 2018 Slurry Seal Project. This project will slurry seal approximately seven (7) centerline miles of streets and will be in construction during the summer of 2018.

Five Year Paving Program (2019-2023)

Given the passage of both Measure 1 and SB 1, these new funding sources provide an annual funding estimate of about \$1.6 to \$1.7 million for pavement maintenance, which equates to a funding estimate of \$9.5M over the next 5 years. In addition, the City Council has allocated \$8M in infrastructure funds to further assist the program for a total of \$10.5M over the next 5 years.

The 5 year program is based on the following guidelines:

1. Utilize the City's pavement management program, StreetSaver, as a platform to find the most cost-effective way in treating City streets.
2. Include an assessment of streets by functional classification.
3. Consider a concentration on arterials due to the heavy usage.
4. Ensure that roadway treatments were planned around the City.
5. Aggregate streets by recommended treatment plan for continuous construction and to minimize disruptions for residents and traffic.
6. Allocate treatments to residential collector streets that would not be chosen by StreetSaver, but serve commercial/business areas, schools and safe routes to school, and including residential streets with history of complaints and maintenance issues.
7. Minimize amount of streets on list that has received recent treatments.

The draft list may not fit the philosophy perfectly but is considered as the most cost-effective while staff continue to programmatically address the pavement needs, utility and development conflicts, and other roadway conflicts in the next five years, or streets improvement in the future.



PROJECTS

2018 Slurry Seal Project – Measure I, CCN 2018-564

Construction began August 3rd. Major dig out, slurry, and striping work has been completed. A few utility lids within the project scope are in progress of being adjusted. The contractor may be working on some other minor items or repairs in anticipation of 2018 Slurry Project completion. Flaggers will be onsite to maintain through traffic.

The City sent out notifications to affected residents very early this summer about the construction work. In addition, the contractor has sent out door hangers as the scheduled work approaches. No parking signs are also posted 24-48 hours prior to the work and should be the most up to date. Public Works does post notifications on our project page and social media outlets as soon as we can, especially if there are any delays or changes.

We kindly remind residents, neighbors, and all passer byers to drive around any wet slurry, wet striping, and new utility lid adjustments before it has a chance to cure to avoid diminishing the value of the slurry seal and tax dollar investment.


Twin Pines Master Plan

Parks and Fields



Staff made repairs to split rail fencing throughout Twin Pines Park this week. The fencing repairs were due in part to weather related issues and vandalism. The split rail fencing is a signature look in Twin Pines Park and offers a rustic affordable and effective fencing solution throughout the park. General maintenance was also conducted in Twin Pines as shrubs and flowering bushes received a late summer/fall pruning.

Trees and shrubs were cut back for vehicle clearance along Hallmark Drive. Within Hallmark Park, several irrigation adjustments and repairs were made. A tennis court net was also repaired. Wood chip mulch was spread at Wakefield Park. Mulching helps to suppress weeds and undesirable plant growth, while also retaining soil moisture.

Field maintenance is in full swing as the fall soccer season is underway. At both Nesbit and Ralston fields, irrigation repairs and adjustments were made. The irrigation systems require regular adjustments and repairs to ensure proper watering and a safe field of play. Potholes and divots caused by gophers were filled and top seeded.

Who?

All single-family households in the RethinkWaste service area*

Why?

To protect the safety of our workers, recycling facilities and the environment. When batteries enter the recycling stream, they can get crushed by compactors and start fires. Batteries contain hazardous materials that can leach into the environment.

How?

Place used batteries and cell phones into the zip-top bag and when nearly full, place bag ON TOP OF YOUR BLACK CART on collection day. For safety, place tape over both ends of each lithium battery and wrap cell phones in paper.
