Belmont Receives State Award of Excellence - Comprehensive Plan

Earlier this week, Belmont accepted the **Award of Excellence - Comprehensive Plan: Small Jurisdiction** for the City's **2035 General Plan, Belmont Village Specific Plan, and Climate Action Plan** at the annual California Chapter American Planning Association (APA) Conference. The awards ceremony took place in San Diego where Belmont was recognized for this significant accomplishment. The APA California Awards Event highlighted the best planning policies, projects and people throughout the State. The purpose of the APA California Awards Program was to encourage quality in planning and increase the public's awareness of the planning profession by recognizing outstanding achievement in the planning field.

This award follows the **APA California - Northern Chapter - Award of Excellence** presented to Belmont in June.

These three long range plans provide a roadmap to guide future development and they work collectively to create lively and attractive public spaces and a unique sense of community and social connectivity in the heart of Belmont. The City is actively pursuing the implementation of these plans.

The community's participation and input during the 2014-2017 plan formulation phase, and all those individuals who worked so diligently behind the scenes are what helped shaped Belmont's award winning [General Plan](#), [BVSP](#), and [Climate Action Plan](#).



Measure KK - Belmont Hotel Room Tax Measure

On June 26, 2018, the City Council adopted a resolution calling a municipal election on a measure to increase the City's transient occupancy tax (TOT) rate from 10% of the rent charged by the operator to 12% of the rent paid by the hotel guest. The measure (Measure KK) is set to be on the November 6, 2018 General Municipal Election ballot.

The City's TOT, or Hotel Room Tax, was last changed in 1978 and does not apply to the markup charged by on-line platforms such as Airbnb. The proposed measure will change the TOT to apply to the markup charged by on-line platforms and bring the City's TOT rate to 12%, which is the rate currently charged by most other cities with a TOT in San Mateo County. The proposed measure is expected to bring in an additional \$560,000 in unrestricted general city revenues annually. The revenue would be administered by the City and used exclusively for city needs such as fixing potholes in city streets, repairing sidewalks, maintaining city police patrols and crime prevention, emergency response, maintaining parks, open space and sports fields. The State could not take any of the revenue from the City. The measure is approved if it receives at least a simple majority of votes (fifty percent plus one) at the November 6, 2018 General Municipal Election.

What else is on the Ballot:

Belmont residents will also vote on Measure CC, Measure WW and three City Council seats. If enacted, Measure CC would make the City Clerk's office an appointed position. If enacted, Measure WW would make the City Treasurer's office an appointed position. The Belmont City Council also has three seats up for election.

Ballot Box

As part of the effort to make more ballot boxes available to voters, two temporary exterior boxes have been installed in Belmont, one at City Hall and one at the Belmont Library on Alameda. They will be available on a 24/7 basis through election day. A drop-off box is also located in the City Clerk's office on the third floor of City Hall, for those who prefer, which is available



during regular business hours. In addition, a number of voting centers are now open, with several more coming being added starting October 27, and even more starting November 3, including the Emergency Operations Center at Belmont City Hall.

City Hall Lobby ADA Compliance/Customer Service Remodel Progress

Phase II of this ADA compliance project continues. Minor adjustments were addressed at the Permit Center counter and installation is now complete. Crews were on site this week installing the security access system on the 3rd floor doors. The wood paneling for the back wall for the Permit Center is expected to be installed towards the end of this month, along with much of the Lobby signage. The project team is focused on addressing an issue with the transaction drawer for the after-hours window which may delay the finalizing the project but will not affect the reopening of the Permit Center to the public.


The Permit Center continues to be temporarily relocated to the 3rd Floor of City Hall until the completion of Phase II. Information regarding interim Permit Center accommodations are available on the City's website.



New Ralston & South Traffic Signal

The new traffic signal at Ralston and South is now fully operational. The signal will improve overall safety for motorists and pedestrians while allowing for better traffic flow and operational efficiency at the intersection.

The public should take note of the new striping at this intersection, which will allow for more efficient pedestrian and car travel through the intersection. **City urges motorists to use caution when traveling through this intersection until everyone become familiar with the new operations.**



As part of the signal commissioning the City has planned this intersection to be fully integrated into its Ralston Corridor Traffic Signal Arterial Synchronization to ensure this intersection operates efficiently with traffic-responsive timing, and coordination with other nearby signalized intersections. The intersection level of service (LOS) is anticipated to improve from the existing all-way stop control, LOS F, to signalized LOS A and B, depending on the peak hour volumes and direction of the travel.

About the Project

The Ralston Avenue Corridor Study and Improvements Project is a Belmont City Council Priority. The City Council through the priority setting process acknowledged the need for a context-sensitive redesign of the Ralston Corridor to not only improve service for existing users, but to also effectuate a preferred future. Crystal Springs Upland School, in collaboration with the City of Belmont, funded and constructed this project as an off-site mitigation as part of the middle school construction on Davis Drive. Improvements are intended to improve Ralston Corridor traffic efficiency with the installation of pedestrian walkways and signalization.

San Mateo County 9-1-1 Centers Now Taking Text-to-911

Effective immediately, all San Mateo County Law Enforcement and Fire Agencies 911 Dispatch Centers, including Belmont, are equipped to receive and respond to mobile phone SMS Text to 911 messages. All phones or devices must include a text or data plan, be text capable, and have their location services enabled to send a text message to 911. Callers who cannot communicate verbally are now able to use the text to 911 service to request help directly from local public safety agencies. This technology directly benefits members of our deaf, hard of hearing and speech-impaired communities as they will now have a more efficient and effective way to request emergency services in times of need.



Additionally, those who find themselves in a situation where it may be too dangerous to dial 911 will have another option to call for help during an emergency. For the deaf, hard of hearing and speech-impaired communities, texting to 911 is always an acceptable way to contact 911 for help. Others should only use the text to 911 feature when speaking to a 911 Dispatcher is not possible or may place an individual at risk. Examples include a domestic abuse situation, an active shooter incident, or an incident that has caused injury resulting in an inability to speak. Otherwise, it is always best to dial 911 and speak with a dispatcher directly.

Here are some helpful tips when using the Text to 911 service:

- Always provide the exact location of the emergency
- Text messages should be brief and easy to understand
- Do not use abbreviations, emojis or slang
- Remember that the ability to send/receive images and videos is limited and often dependent on the cellular provider
- Texts can only be received in English at this time - this service will be available in additional languages in the near future
- Do not include others when texting to 9-1-1 (no group texting)

Remember - Only call 911 in the event of an emergency and only text to 911 when calling is not an option. For more information on text to 911 visit the San Mateo County Communications Manager's Association website at www.CMASMC.com

PUBLIC WORKS

Public Outreach- Ralston Corridor Open House



On October 10th Public Works hosted a Ralston Corridor Open House. The City's Engineering Consultant TJKM, and City staff presented the latest design of the improvements in segments 1 and 2, answered questions and received feedback from residents and corridor users.

The project will be placed on the Council agenda in November to present 65% design and receive comments. The project is scheduled to go out to bid in early spring of 2019 with the construction taking place in summer.



TRAFFIC ADVISORIES

Ralston Avenue Sewer Rehabilitation Project Phase II:

Ralston Avenue:

The plumbing contractor will be continuing work on Ralston Avenue between Alameda de las Pulgas and Villa Avenue. Contractor will continue to work their way down Ralston Avenue and prepare all manhole locations for the pipe reaming of existing 12-inch VCP to 18-inch HDPE. This work is scheduled to take place from Monday, October 15, 2018 through Friday, October 19, 2018 with extended construction hours from 9:00 am – 4:00pm. Traffic evaluations will take place and granted working hours will be adjusted accordingly at the City of Belmont discretion. Traffic control and flaggers will be in place during these working hours to help alleviate traffic congestion.

Belmont Sewer and Water Rehabilitation:

Francis Avenue, Academy, and Davey Glen Road:

The construction contractor is continuing to work on punch list items in various location, and paving contractor will be continuing to raise utility valves, manholes, and finish work for the paving. This work is scheduled for Monday, October 15 – Friday, October 19, 2018. Striping of the new pavement on Francis Avenue, Academy Avenue, and Davey Glen Road may take place on Thursday October 4, and Friday, October 5, 2018. This work will take place between normal working hours of 8:00 am – 5:00 pm. Traffic control and flaggers will be stationed when working in the right-of-way.

Shoreway Sewer Replacement Project:

Shoreway Road:

The contractor will be continue excavating and installing the new sewer main along Shoreway Road. Traffic control with one lane closed and flaggers will be stationed. This work is scheduled for the week of Monday, October 15, 2018 to Friday, October 19, 2018 with normal working hours of 8:00 am – 5:00 pm.

Ralston Avenue between Granada Street and Furlong Street:

Ralston Avenue:

The Belmont Traffic Operations Division will be striping in front of Fire Station No.14 on Friday, October 19 between the hours of 10 AM and 2 PM.

TRAFFIC OPERATIONS DIVISION



In response to several Traffic Parking and Safety Committee requests by Belmont residents, the Traffic Operations Division performed the following work in the Downtown area:

- ✚ Striped both a centerline and guidelines on Sixth Avenue from O'Neill Avenue to Harbor Blvd.
- ✚ Installed 25 MPH signs on the north and south ends of both Fifth Avenue and Sixth Avenue
- ✚ Installed traffic calming signage (Curve/15 MPH) on Molitor Road where the highest 85% speed was registered in a recent traffic study

More work is scheduled to take place in the Downtown neighborhood including painting bicycle sharrows (shared lane markings) on Sixth Avenue to complete the striping.



SEWER DIVISION

The Sewer Division performed preventative maintenance throughout Belmont. Below are highlights from this week's activity:

- Performed weekly sewer pump station preventive maintenance on 11 sewer pump stations
- Hydro cleaned 23,770 linear feet of city sewer main line on both the streets and easements of basin 8, 9, 10 and 11
- Video inspected 659 linear feet of city sewer main line throughout the city
- Continuing to test wireless ultrasonic sensor from Flow Group Services to monitor targeted sewer manholes for high flow levels to help prevent sanitary sewer overflows
- Worked with consultants on North Road sewer pump station force main rehabilitation project design by mapping out sewer laterals of EL Camino Real businesses to determine any conflict with new force main
- Replaced and raised manhole cover, manhole frame and surrounding concrete of manhole on Ralston Avenue at Elmer Street that had sunken several inches.

- Phones and cell phones
- Fax machines, copiers, printers, scanners
- Televisions, VCRs, DVD players
- Computers (CPUs), monitors, laptops, keyboards, hard drives
- Electronic video games and toys

Items NOT accepted include:

- Batteries of any kind
- Fluorescent lightbulbs, tubes and ballasts
- Large appliances: stoves, dryers and washing machines, air conditioners
- Refrigerators and other items containing freon (water and wine coolers), etc.
- Smoke detectors
- Solar panels
- Thermostats

Working items will be donated to local Goodwill stores for reuse.

A consultant, Gates + Associates, has been engaged to prepare outreach and engagement events to assess the community's vision for the park and will prepare conceptual designs outlining the park's future improvements. The master plan will be presented to the Parks & Recreation Commission and City Council.

In conjunction with Gates + Associates, the Parks & Recreation Department will host 'pop-up' booths at upcoming events. At the booth, community members of all ages can provide valuable input towards this effort.
