The Council has until November 9, 2019 (60 days) to complete all actions necessary to fill this vacancy. At its meeting on September 10, 2019, the City Council determined that it wanted to appoint a resident to fill the vacancy. During the discussion on September 10th, the City Council directed that staff return with options regarding the application process. The Council has

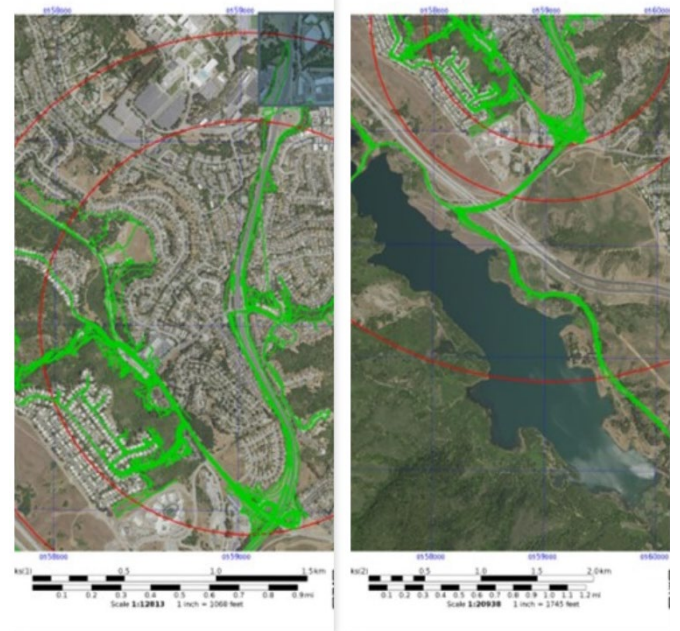

broad authority to appoint an individual to fill the vacancy after deliberation and a majority vote of the Council. There is no required process for making the appointment or for conducting interviews. Search continues for Missing Person Paul Farmer

ON SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 14TH, San Mateo County Sheriff's Office Search & Rescue, along with members of the SMCDFD Community Emergency Response Team (C.E.R.T.) assisted the Belmont Police Department with a detailed search, in hopes of developing information leading to the whereabouts of missing person Paul Farmer. The search took place in

the area of Highway 92, Highway 280 and Canada Road and involved a total of 80 personnel, 25 of whom were CERT Volunteers. Unfortunately, the search yielded no evidence or leads. Belmont PD detectives will continue their investigation and follow up on all new tips, and urge anyone with information on this case to call the Belmont Police Department at 650-595-7400.

Coastal Cleanup Day Saturday, September 21, 2019

CALIFORNIA COASTAL CLEANUP DAY was first organized by the Coastal Commission, but the idea of a statewide cleanup event did not come from California. In 1984, Oregon resident Judy Neilson had grown concerned over the amount of plastic debris she saw littering the Oregon coast. In October of that year, Judy organized the first statewide beach cleanup event, calling it the "Plague of Plastics." California watched, admired, and in 1985, emulated Judy's efforts with its first statewide Coastal Cleanup Day.

Close to 2,500 Californians joined in the initial Cleanup, and the program has been growing by leaps and bounds ever since. In 1986. For more history and cleanup results in past years visit: California Coastal Commission

THE CITY HAS A COMPREHENSIVE preventative maintenance program to inspect, monitor and maintain 1,400 of our storm drain inlets throughout the city. Regular scheduled street sweeping is in place, with enhanced sweeping during winter months. "No Dumping-Flows to Bay" storm drain placards are installed on every storm drain. The Belmont Public Works Department has also installed trash capture devices in 69 storm drains where litter activities have been an issue.

2019 Storm and Sewer Repair Project

The 2019 Storm and Sewer Repair Project has completed major work at the following locations:

- Ruth Ave along Malcolm Ave
- Fairway Dr near Notre Dame Ave
- Continentals Way near Lyall
- Coronet Blvd near Ewell Rd

Work on Semeria Ave is currently in progress and expected to wrap up by next week.

The contractor is scheduled to move towards sewer and storm lines in the following order of locations:

- Lincoln Ave near Dekoven Ave
- San Ardo Way
- Coronet Blvd near Kimmie Ct & Coronet Blvd near Ralston Ave

A notice from the City and a notice from the Contractor will be sent out to residents within the vicinity of the construction work as scheduled work approaches.

As some roadway will be trenched, the road will need to be closed to through traffic in both directions during working hours. No overnight road closure will take place. No parking will be allowed during full road closure.

Single lane closures will be required at some locations during working hours. No parking will be allowed on closed side of the street. Through traffic and driveway access will be maintained when possible. If you have any special access needs during the pavement operations, please contact us for accommodations. Please note the time, date, and location of the Temporary No Parking on the street and plan to park accordingly. The Temporary No Parking signs will contain the most updated parking restriction information.

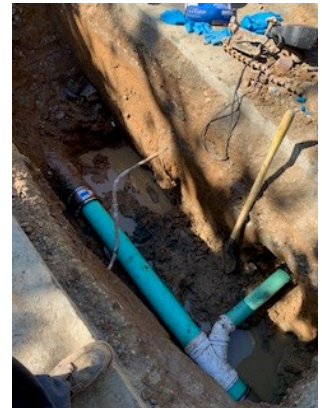

California High-Speed Rail Authority Board Adopts Preferred Alternatives in Northern California

SAN JOSE, Calif. – On Tuesday, September 17, 2019, the California High-Speed Rail Authority (Authority) Board of Directors concurred with staff recommendations for the Preferred Alternatives for the high-speed rail routes in Northern California. The Board's concurrence comes after nearly a decade of analysis and active engagement with communities along the route. The staff released its recommendations in July and led a comprehensive outreach effort to provide the Board of Directors with feedback before bringing its recommendations to the Board.

"The Board's adoption of the Preferred Alternatives is a major milestone for the high-speed rail program in Northern California," said Brian Kelly, Chief Executive Officer for the Authority. "This action allows the Authority to prepare for the next steps in moving the project forward in Northern California. I appreciate the hard work and dedication that our team put into getting this action finalized."

"This is a positive first step to realizing a true Valley to Valley connection, and ensuring that the community voice is heard," said Senator Jim Beall (D-San Jose).

"The process to date has benefited greatly from the engagement of the communities and other local and state entities along the corridor. We look forward to continuing that public conversation as we move forward with the finalizing the draft

environmental documents in Northern California," said Northern California Regional Director Boris Lipkin.

In the San Jose to Merced project section, the Board identified Alternative 4 as the Preferred Alternative. Alternative 4 utilizes a blended configuration between San Jose and Gilroy in the existing Caltrain and Union Pacific Railroad corridors before continuing to a dedicated high-speed rail alignment through Pacheco Pass.

In the San Francisco to San Jose project section, the Board identified Alternative A as the Preferred Alternative. Alternative A utilizes a blended configuration between San Francisco and San Jose within the existing Caltrain corridor. This alternative includes a light maintenance facility on the east side of the tracks in Brisbane and does not include additional passing tracks.

The Board's concurrence directs staff to proceed with project development and to continue to engage local partners to address comments and concerns. Staff will concurrently work to finish the Draft Environmental Impact Report and Environmental Impact Statement (Draft EIR/EIS) for both the San Francisco to San Jose and San Jose to Merced project sections.

The draft environmental documents are due out in early 2020 for the San Jose to Merced project section and in spring 2020 for the San Francisco to San Jose project section. While all alternatives will be evaluated equally in the draft environmental documents, identifying the Preferred Alternatives will guide the public as to what is most likely to become the project. Final route decisions will be made at the conclusion of the environmental review process.

MPWD COMMEMORATES SPECIAL DISTRICTS WEEK

BELMONT, CA (September, 2019) –Special Districts Week, September 22-28, was established by the California State Legislature earlier this year with bi-partisan approval of Assembly Concurrent Resolution (ACR) 89. The Mid-Peninsula Water District (MPWD) encourages residents and business/industry owners in Belmont, San Carlos, and San Mateo County to support Special Districts Week and continue their long-standing civic engagement with their local government.

“This is a wonderful opportunity to raise awareness about the importance of special districts to our communities. Local governance was the founding principle behind the establishment of special districts in the state of California more than 100 years ago. It’s just as important and vital today as it was back then,” states Tammy Rudock, MPWD’s General Manager. Louis Vella, MPWD Board President, added, “We not only encourage the involvement of customers within the oversight and functioning of MPWD as a special district itself, but also within their own city, county, and state through direct engagement and volunteerism.”

ACR 89 was sponsored by The California Special Districts Association (CSDA), which is a statewide association representing more than 1,000 special districts and affiliate organizations throughout the state. Special districts are local government entities created by a community’s residents, funded by those residents, and overseen by those residents, to provide specialized services and infrastructure.

MPWD was formed in 1929 as a special district with the mission to provide quality water and service to Belmont, San Carlos, and San Mateo County. Celebrating its 90th anniversary this year, MPWD continues its commitment to that mission through ongoing capital improvement projects, sound financial planning, attention to customer service, and community outreach.

“Special districts are formed by residents to provide essential services that they want and need at the local level. They provide an opportunity to have local control while enhancing services that make communities thrive and survive,” said CSDA’s CEO Neil McCormick. He continued, “We appreciate the Legislature’s support in raising awareness and increasing understanding about the special districts that serve our State’s communities.”



ABOUT THE MID-PENINSULA WATER DISTRICT: The MPWD has been functioning as a public utility since 1929, proudly providing service to the communities of Belmont and portions of San Carlos, Redwood City, and unincorporated San Mateo County. The District supplies water to 28,000 consumers within approximately five square miles. It is managed by a five-member elected Board of Directors and 17 full-time employees.
